

UPDATE Sept 10

Dear Friends,

Winter is finished and the weather is starting to warm up. October is our hottest month at a steady 35-37 degrees. Everyone is then waiting for the rains to arrive around December to cool things off a little.

Dalitso Play

We are currently running 2 morning sessions where mothers/care givers learn how to play with their children. Equipment is provided in the sessions (most of which could be reproduced or adapted in their homes) to enable mothers to learn/use skills during their own time with their children.



Shapes and numbers

Each session conforms to the same Early Learning Goals you would find at any nursery in England as there is no standard strategy in Malawi. A session typically involves singing, a bible story, free play activity and focussed play led by one of the team. Items are brought from their homes to see how the things around them can help their children

learn. When they do not have much at home it is a real challenge, so we use very simple things like leaves, clay mud, flowers and stones and think of creative ways they can be used. (see the photo)

Dalitso Leaders

September sees the culmination of the year long Follow Me and Follow Me 2 courses. 31 leaders graduated from Follow Me and will soon start FM2. We had a wonderful graduation ceremony and George Rogers was able to share his experience of leadership and present the certificates.

Community CHE

In Mbanga some villagers who do not believe in CHE are trying to discourage those who are working very hard with us. This has made some stop coming for CHE lessons.

We have lost the family of Chibise who I mentioned a few months ago. Samson's wife Eda died recently of Malaria. They were both very active in CHE; we were having lessons in their home, Samson was the best encourager and became a role model in the village. In our culture

you are chased away if your spouse dies and it is not your home village – we are sad because of this cultural practice and that he was forced to move.

The wife of Chief Chimaimba told me that "Before I was going to the toilet in the graveyard. It was not good as I now know it spreads disease; also there is no respect as you can meet other people there, which is not good. I was bathing at night down by the marsh. We now have a toilet, a bathroom, a refuse pit and a dish drying rack. We are learning things we never knew before."

The 8 health visitors we trained have started home visits. They are encouraged to visit 10 families and have started very good. The healthy lesson which they have started teaching their neighbour is the cause of malaria. We thought of malaria to be the first lesson because of Eda's death.

In Ndumira activities are going well too, but we are facing a challenge with the committee chairperson not doing his responsibilities. Malawians are not used to doing development themselves, but like people to do it to them. It needs a

lot of encouraging for those who are involved in CHE because it is a new thing to develop yourself. Help us in prayer that we handle this with wisdom without harming anybody. Next week the CHEs will start home visits so we are pleased activities are still going ahead.

We have also seen many deaths in this area recently and our work has been very disrupted. Mthali approached the Chiefs to allow people who are close to the funeral to go, but releasing others to work and develop themselves. This is counter culture: it was a risk and too much brave to ask. We are surprised that the Chiefs welcomed the idea, but want to develop it slowly as people may understand as they have been used to one system for a long time.

Family CHE - healthy families creating healthy villages.

Three families that we are working with have the challenge to teach others what they have learned. They have hesitation and I do understand this for 2 reasons.

- 1. The information is power and this can be used positively and negatively.
- 2. Doubting themselves that they can pass information without faults The family of Staiford have two families there are visiting and sharing with, but the other families need an encouragement to keep doing it. *Chippo.*
